In English, we are going to be continuing with our writing focus on World War 1 and World War 2. The children have already started their learning on the Christmas Truce story, understanding what happened and the significance around the miracle event. We've even used the Sainsbury's Christmas advert to inform us on what happened. The children will be writing diary entries based on a British soldier's point of view, how he felt and what he saw.	This term, our shared text is 'The Final Year' by Matt Goodman. The story is a powerful tearjerker, based on a topic that's not often written about—the experiences and emotions of leaving primary school. It follows a Year 6 student who's already struggling with anxiety and now he's worried about it all coming to an end. His journey takes heartbreaking turns and the children will use the story to help with their transition to secondary school.	After months of hard work and diligent learning from all our six students, the children have managed to finish all their primary school maths curriculum with a halterm spare. Because of this, the children will be able to turn their attention to recapping their skills through a series of exciting maths projects. In this time, we will be accountants, managing bank accounts, picking jobs and evening moving out and paying rent. The children will also attempt to build a budget for a

Science History Geography ASSIA ASS

For our final science unit, the children will learn how living things on Earth have changed over time and how fossils provide evidence for this. Genetics will also take a focus with children learning how characteristics are passed from parents to their offspring and how variation in offspring can affect their survival, with changes (adaptations) possibly leading to the evolution of a species. Charles Dawrin will also get an honorable mention in this unit.

The children will continue their history topic- Britain at War. This project teaches children about the causes, events and consequences of the First and Second World Wars, the influence of new inventions on warfare, how life in Great Britain was affected and the legacy of the wars in the post-war period. Our learning will start with WW1, taking children on a journey of its twists and turns.

For our final focus in geography, we will be focussing on a recapping of skills and knowledge from the whole year. It will additionally look back on some of the learning in year 3, 4 and 5 with the children being able to showcase all of their extensive knowledge. With the warmer weather on the horizon, the children will be able to take this opportunity to take some learning outside.

ESCAPE TO A WHOLE NEW WORLD		
This last term of music for Year 6 will be a mash-up of skills, using music tech for compositions, developing performance and singing techniques and dabbling into music genres of their choice. They will also learn the basics of songwriting-using known tunes to create an end of year songwhilst utilising their knowledge of music notation.	Our art and design unit is called 'Bees, Beetles and Butterflies'. This project is linked to Britain at War. This project teaches children about sketchbooks, observational drawing, mixed media collage and Pop Art. They will consolidate their learning to make a final piece of artwork inspired by bees, beetles or butterflies.	This final DT project is linked to the war and British propaganda during this time: it is called Make Do ANd Mend, taking inspiration from the famous Mrs Sew & Sew and clothing rations. This project teaches children a range of simple sewing stitches, including ways of recycling and repurposing old clothes and materials. The final result - an outfit made by the children from recycled clothes.

In computing, we will be learning how to use CAD software with the aim of inventing our very own products, hopefully harnessing some of our children's entrepreneurial skills. We will code the product, debug it and even make its own website and advertisement.	For RE, we will be learning about Sewa, which is a selfless service in Sikhism with a focus on love and finally will be looking into humanism, diving into the river of life, seeking happiness in this life and helping others to do the same.	Our topics in PSHE will be 'Changing Me'. This unit will cover puberty and babies from conception to birth. We will also be thinking about the year ahead and supporting the children with their transition to secondary school.
